Bangor and Pen Argyl Battle | PA House Republicans Continue Fight Against Crime by Holding Violent Criminals Accountable

Members of the Pennsylvania House Republican Caucus unveiled a set of bills aimed at protecting Pennsylvanians by bringing accountability to violent criminals in the Commonwealth.

The legislation is part of a four-pillared package unveiled by House Republicans aimed at combatting crimes in Pennsylvania. Wednesday's press conference focused on the third and fourth pillars, which cover prosecution and punishment. Other measures in the package focused on prevention and policing.

The press conference featured legislation sponsored by Reps. Craig Williams (R-Delaware), Tim Bonner (R-Mercer/ Butler) and Clint Owlett (R-Tioga/Bradford).

Williams' bill would address the application of sentencing guidelines. Citing the fact certain district attorneys and judges regularly depart from the guidelines, often with downward departures for serious offenses, Williams' bill

would create a presumption that the guidelines apply and thus limit the discretion of a sentencing court only to sentence within the applicable guideline ranges.

"Pennsylvania's sentencing guidelines are designed to ensure justice is applied consistently across the Commonwealth. However, when these guidelines are treated as mere suggestions, it undermines public safety and erodes trust in our legal system," said Williams. "My bill ensures that sentencing guidelines are followed,

and judges can only depart from them in specific, justified circumstances. We owe it to our communities to make sure serious criminals face the full weight of the law, and that justice is both fair and firm."

Legislation sponsored by Bonner aims to end the lack of statewide uniformity on the availability of bail, as his bill would expand the role of the Pennsylvania Sentencing Commission by charging it with publishing guidelines for the availability of bail and CRIME cont'd on page 4



conditions for pretrial release of defendants.

"Some of the most violent jurisdictions in our Commonwealth are granting bail very liberally. That is not only baffling but also potentially risky," Bonner said. "Clear guidelines provided by the Sentencing Commission will ensure much-needed transparency and uniformity in the bail process."

Owlett's legislation would ensure fair punishment of those who have committed crimes against multiple victims by requiring sentences for each crime to be served consecutively, rather than concurrently. Owlett has a second bill in the package that would create a specific offense for wearing a mask to disguise one's identity during the commission of a crime.

"Regardless of where you live in the Commonwealth, anyone can become a victim of a crime," Owlett said. "Each of the pillars of this anti-crime package phn9yk.

 from prevention and policing to prosecution and punishment – are vital to creating the kinds of safe communities we all deserve to call home."

Garden Dilemmas? Ask Mary!

Hello Fellow Readers, It's a joy to walk the streets of Victorian architecture in Cape May, located at the very tip of New Jersey. It has attracted vacationers since the mid-18th century, designating Cape May as the country's oldest seaside resort. Glorious gardens and monarch butterflies abound, indicating a healthy habitat.

As I meandered by a fig tree that towered almost to the roof of a twostory home, I thought, that's a heck of a tree to wrap over winter. Fig trees are native to the tropics, with a few species considered semi-tropical, and will grow unprotected in zones 8 to 10. Cape May is in USDA zone 7b, one or two zones warmer than ours, but you can grow hardier figs with the proper winter protection.

mon fig (Ficus carica), such as Brown Turkey, Chicago, or Celeste, are best, and it's best to skip growing them in the ground north of zone 6. Instead, use containers and bring them to a protected area in the winter where temperatures won't dip below 20 degrees.

Fig trees like to be root-bound (tight in their pot) to produce the most fruit. Up-size the pot each year until your tree reaches the size you care to maneuver. Afterward, you'll need to root prune every three years and return Mr. Fig to the same pot. Yup, it's an effort.

So, as I walked closer to the beefy tree with its shiny course leaves, I noticed a sign: FREE FIGS in capital letters on a bright yellow board. Bulleted below are the rules.

Pick ripe ones (yellow and soft), and Please Take 2 Max per Person. Don't Be a Fig Pig! Donations appreciated.

While chuckling over, Don't be a Fig Pig, a car exits the driveway.

"Did you find any?" the gentlemen asked.

"I wasn't looking to pick, but I love your sign and admire the size of the fig tree. How do you wrap such a giant?"

"It's on the south side of the house, so there's no need to wrap it."

The idea of offe-Cultivars of the com- ring figs for free and in-



viting a donation came after learning that someone was coming uninvited and picking the figs clean. Talk about a Fig Pig. More like a fig thief! Taking things, picking flowers, or helping yourself to anything that is not yours astounds me. The culprit, Warren found out, is a neighbor who owns a restaurant in town. Seriously? It seems he would be more aware of the wrongs of pilfering food. Warren took it in stride, and now that he's retired, he can oversee his bounty.

"It was a banner year making \$183 for the local cub and boy scout

I was given a baby fig tree as a rite of passage when I married into a family of Italian descent. I was outwardly appreciative but inwardly dreading the hassles of overwintering it. Never mind the parade of ants I recall seeing on the mother plant next to their pool.

Don't get me wrong,

I'm fond of figs. But I prefer the uncomplicated way of enjoying them, wrapped in the long-loved Fig Newton, rather than wrestling with wrapping a fig tree.

I religiously clothed my potted baby fig in old blankets from the bottom of the pot to the top of the tree, lassoing the garb with garden twine. Carpet, carpet foam, quilts, and pink insulation fiberglass work too. I was diligent for years, then missed the timeline. Rittersweet

It wasn't that I didn't give a fig; I felt terrible for the baby that grew head high. I'd have given the fig away rather than kill the laborious tree. (Not giving a fig is an old-time idiom that means not caring at all, originating from the 15th-century English poem The Court of Love. Not that I knew that without a search, but now you have a G-rated option.)

Did you know the





first Fig Newton was baked in 1891? It's incredible how some things last forever and others, well, not so much. Though true, the husband that

came with the fig lasted a decade longer.


