

For the seventh consecutive year, the Board of Governors for Pennsylvania's State System of Higher Education (PASSHE) froze tuition for in-state undergraduates for the 2024-25 academic year. The tuition rate will stay the same at all 10 state-owned public universities. PASSHE schools serve the most in-state students of any four-year college or university in Pennsylvania, at the lowest price. Nearly 90% of PASSHE's 82,000 students are Pennsylvania residents, many from middle-income families. To make higher education more affordable, the Senate passed Grow PA – a package of bills that creates new programs to recruit the best talent to Pennsylvania schools in industries that will grow the state's economy while also expanding existing financial assistance programs that are already working. Sen. Brown Announces Agreement Between PennDOT and National Park Service on Rt. 611 Closure



Sen. Rosemary M. Brown (R-40)nounced today that an agreement has been reached between the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT) and the National Park Service to begin temporary work on Route 611 in the Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area. The agreement marks a significant step forward in reopening the road-way which has been closed since December 6, 2022, causing substantial disruption to residents, businesses and commuters.

"I am absolutely thrilled to share that after extensive discussions and collaborative efforts, PennDOT and the National Park Service have agreed on a temporary solution to reopen Route 611," said Brown.

The work will involve the installation of a temporary rockfall barrier, which will enable traffic to open through a portion of the affected three-mile section. Once the permit is issued by the National Park Service, PennDOT expects the work will take roughly six weeks to complete.

"This is a critical step in restoring accessibility and alleviating the hardships faced by our residents and businesses," said Brown. "While this is a temporary fix, it is an important move toward a permanent resolution. I will continue to advocate for a comprehensive, long-term solution that balances all interests."

Route 611, owned and maintained by PennDOT, runs through the Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area, which is managed by the National Park Service. The roadway was initially closed in April 2022 due to heavy rains washing out sections, and subsequent rockslides necessitated further safety measures.

"I want to publicly thank PennDOT for their persistence in collaboration," said Brown. "I am optimistic that this temporary solution will provide the necessary relief to our community as we continue to work toward a permanent resolution."

Updates will be provided as the temporary work progresses and plans for a long-term solution are developed.

"Home" Means a Dream Come True for Single Phillipsburg Mom and Family

On June 15th, at 10:00am, Jaiden Fischer stood in front of her new home with her brother, Biagio, and son, Jedrek by her side. She was joined by almost one hundred members of the community: neighbors, fellow Warren County Habitat for Humanity (Warren County Habitat) Homeowners and their families, volunteers, staff, and other community partners. After over a year of hard work, 250+ hours she put into building her own home and juggling between two and four jobs at any given time, Jaiden received the keys to her own front door.

Jaiden and her brother Biagio are no strangers to change. Having been moved around very often as children, they were never in one "home" for very long. When she finally moved into her own apartment after having her son, and Biagio was still living in a group home, she would tell her brother. "If I had a house you could stay with me, but I just don't have the room." He had been going through his own hardships, and Jaiden became focused on a way to not only provide for her son, but wanted to be able to give them both a place to call their forever home.

Like other times in her life, Jaiden feels that her pain and struggles were times when



God was showing her

his plans for her.
"When I was eight years old, [one of my older sisters and II were staying away at a sleepaway camp to find God amidst our struggles and some suffering in a place we thought was home. We were so happy to get away and to be at this camp with people who were surrounded by love and devotion. During our stay here we were unfortunately taken away, [and placed] in foster care where we faced many feelings of hardship and defeat. But this is where I later learned that God was saving me.

During my time with Habitat for Humanity, her brother too. She I often felt like it was a nice little getaway from reality, kind of like how I felt when I was eight years old... ...I found myself surrounded by love and devotion again, and I

Jaiden's new home, the sixth home built on Beidleman Road in Franklin Township, NJ, is a testament to a four-year long journey for Warren County Habitat for Humanity. The plot of land that is now home to six Warren County Habitat Partner Families was donated to the organization by Franklin Township, and in 2020, work of-ficially began. This became Warren County Habitat for Huma-nity's first "Habitat neighborhood", as the community Habitat affectionately calls it, and the organization is incredibly grateful for the chance to build not just homes, but a true Habitat community where children and families can grow and

Little Sprouts Offers Preschool to Local NJ Students


Students ages 3 and 4 are invited to attend preschool at the Little Sprouts Early Learning Center. In addition to daycare and preschool, the Little Sprouts Early Learning Center offers care for children before and after school, as well as during the summer. Enrollment in the center's daycare and preschool programs is currently underway. The Little Sprouts Early Learning Center is conveniently located on the campus of Project Self-Sufficiency, across from Sussex County Community College, at 127 Mill Street in Newton. The Little Sprouts Early Learning Cen-

ter features separate classrooms for each age group, from infancy through preschool. The center uses Creative Curriculum, the curriculum approved by the State of New Jersey and endorsed by the National Association for the Education of Young Children, in all classrooms to help children learn important skills in math, literacy, science, social studies, the arts, and technology. Fully qualified teachers are available in each school room and the child-teacher ratio adte standards.

The availability of an on-site vegetable garden and weekly visits by Master Gardeners provides interactive instruction about nutrition, the origin of food, cooking, and other topics. The curriculum is enhanced by frequent special guests who read to the stu-dents and offer simple lessons in the arts.

Each classroom has new equipment, as well as learning centers for dramatic play, computers, science, housekeeping, sand, and water play, reading, and music. The center also contains an all-purpose room for active indoor play and parent presentations, as well as a sick room for those children who may fall ill during the day. The center is equipped with two separate playgrounds, one for vounger tots and one for older children.

Little Sprouts Early Learning Center offers space for 83 youngsters, ages 6 weeks to 6 years. All types of subsidized daycare are accepted, including New Jersey Cares for Kids and Work First New Jersey. For Bangor's Jennifer Rago, Cooking At The Chuck Wagon Is The Perfect Retirement

Jennifer Rago worked in the mental health industry for many years, helping individuals and families get through a crisis of one kind or another. You could say that Rago, now retired, has found her own version of mental self therapy. And it comes with a trip back in time.

Rago, longtime resident of Bangor, spends much of her summer at Wild West City in Byram Township, N.J., as a reanactor, often times cooking viddles and coffee over a fire at the Chuck Wagon.

Wild West City has been entertaining audiences for over six decades with live action-packed shows, train and stagecoach rides, demonstrations, historical exhibits, music, special events and an opportunity to mingle with cowboys and cowgirls in "Dodge City."

Rago has been doing plenty of entertaining herself as a reanactor, interacting with visitors who want to learn about the ways of the old west. How did Rago making Wild West City her second "career"?

"I had first visited Wild West City when my daughter's elementary school class went there for a class trip," she said. "I have always loved American history, horses, and the Amewest/cowboys. rican When I retired I decided that I was going to spend my time doing things I loved but did not necessarily have the time to do when I was working. Being an avid fan of spaghetti westerns, 1950's westerns, and American history made joining Wild West City a natural choice."

It's a lot different than her last "career."

"I worked in the men-



tal health- addictions field for 20 plus years as a counselor, executive director, and assistant vice president, in clinical," said Rago. "I retired early because of COVID and its negative effect on resources for mental health and addictions. Public and government healthcare funding was redirected to COVID reducing addictions funding and increasing death via ad-

to have Rago aboard." "Jennifer has really taken on her role here with spirit, dedication

and excitement," said Katie Benson, whose family has owned the park for over 60 years. "She is eager to share her knowledge of the old American west with others - and she makes a great cup of coffee too!" Rago's family and friends were not surpri-

sed to see that she gravitated to Wild West City. "My friends thought

 mv children and husband know all too well how much I love this genre and are glad I have found other people who love it as much as I do," said Rago.

Ironically, although she spends a lot of her time at the Chuck Wagon, Rago admits that it's been a learning curve in more ways than

"I'm not much of a cook but I have developed a real interest in pioneer cooking," she said. "I watch a lot of YouTube, read and ask a lot of questions. I love looking and reading about period specific clothing and accessories and of course pioneer food."

While others in retirement might not be unable to come up with a plan for retirement, Rago has seemlessly found something that suits her just perfectly.

"I love working with other people who love the history and traditions of the American west as much as I do,' she said.



PENNSYLVANIA ABCILO 34 LET FREEDOM RING

The Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT) has unveiled a new standard license plate for vehicles. The new plate, showcasing Pennsylvania as the birthplace of America, will be available in 2025. It features the Liberty Bell and the text, "Let Freedom Ring." Military, special organization, special fund and specialty plates without legislatively mandated designs will also be updated with the new design. If you would like to be one of the first to get the new license plate, sign up for updates. You will be notified when the license plate is ready to order. When the plates become available, fee information will be included with replacement instructions on PennDOT's website and will vary based on plate type and any optional personalization. The department and its partners will use all existing standard issue license plate inventory before transitioning to the new plate design.



Blairstown airport is one of the nicest old time airports that has kept its charm for nearly 100 years. It was built by a local farmer, W. K. Dickson on 151 acres. Limiting the Use of Smartphones in Schools

Legislation to improve student mental health, academic performance and social skills by limiting student smartphone use in schools has been signed into law. The measure allows schools the option of using dedicated school safety funding for se-cure, lockable smartphone bags in which students deposit their mobile devices until the end of the school



day.
Senate Bill 700,
now Act 55 of 2024,
amended the School
Safety and Mental He-

alth Grant Program to allow for the purchase of these smartphone bags as an eligible use of funding. As part of the grant program, school districts receive an automatic base grant of \$100,000 and each intermediate unit, area career and technical school, charter school, regional charter school or cyber charter school is provided an automatic base grant of \$70,000.
